Provincial Municipal Support Budget 2025-26

The 2025-26 Budget delivers \$533.8 million of direct provincial support to municipalities, a decrease of \$23.1 million, or 4.1 per cent, from 2024-25 Budget, primarily due to lower requirements for cost-shared programs, specifically the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Fund. Municipal programs and supports that are exclusively funded by the province will see an increase of \$36 million, or 6.6 per cent.

Revenue Sharing

- The 2025-26 Budget delivers \$361.8 million for Municipal Revenue Sharing (MRS), an increase of \$21.6 million, or 6.3 per cent, from the 2024-25 Budget.
- MRS is calculated as 0.75 of 1.0 percentage point of Provincial Sales Tax (PST) revenue from two years prior; in 2023-24, PST revenue was \$2.9 billion.

Infrastructure Funding

- The 2025-26 Budget delivers \$109.7 million in provincial support for municipal infrastructure, a decrease of \$54.0 million, or 33.0 per cent, from the 2024-25 Budget due to a decrease in the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP) and New Building Canada Fund (NBCF).
 - \$76.5 million for the provincial portion of the Investing in Canada Infrastructure
 Program; the total program budget including both federal and provincial portions is
 \$174.5 million (Government Relations);
 - \$4.0 million for the provincial portion of the NBCF; the total program budget is \$4.0 million as no further revenue is expected from the federal government and the federal portion is provided directly to recipients from the federal government (Government Relations);
- \$18.4 million for the Rural Integrated Roads for Growth (Highways);
- \$8.6 million for the Urban Connector Program (Highways); and,
- \$2.2 million for the Strategic Partnership Program (Highways).

Other Funding

- The 2025-26 budget delivers \$62.3 million in other funding for municipalities, an increase of \$9.3 million, or 17.6 per cent, from the 2024-25 Budget. Funding consists of:
 - o \$29.0 million in policing grants (Corrections, Policing and Public Safety);
 - \$11.6 million grant to provincial Libraries (Education);
 - \$9.2 million for Grants-in-Lieu of Taxes to municipalities and libraries (Government Relations);
 - \$3.8 million for the Transit Assistance for People with Disabilities Program (Government Relations);
 - \$603,000 for Grants-in-Lieu of Property Taxes (Libraries) (Government Relations);
 - \$3.2 million for the Community Rink Affordability Grant (Parks, Culture and Sport);
 - \$1.6 million for the Discounted Bus Pass Program used by individuals and families who access SAID, SIS and SES, as well as Provincial Training Allowance (Social Services);
 - \$1.0 million for Grants to Food Banks of Saskatchewan (Social Services);
 - \$1.4 million grant funding for Urban Parks (Parks, Culture and Sport and Advanced Education); and,
 - \$850,000 for the Community Airports Partnership Program (Highways).
